Almost 8,000 Vermonters experienced homelessness last year, including 2,000 children.

The average temperature in Springfield, VT in January 2024 was just 21 degrees.

In January 2024, 26 of the 31 nights were below freezing in Springfield, VT.

Vermont's emergency housing program kicks in when the temperatures go below freezing in the winter months, but not enough motels participate in the program, leaving people out in the cold.
